Offer Korin has been instrumental in making Katz & Korin one of the fastest-growing law firms in Indiana in the past 10 years.

The firm, founded in September 1994, now has 38 employees, including 19 attorneys practicing in diverse areas.

"In large measure, our growth is attributable to his leadership in the legal community and in working with businesses throughout the country," said his nominator.

"It's been a rapid, fun growth. I'm very proud of the way the firm works together," said Korin, noting that the law practice will move into new quarters on the Central Canal in March.

He is active with the Federal Bar Association as an officer and is a member of the Local Rules Committee for the U.S. District Court. He has represented clients at nearly every level of judicial review, from the trial court level to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Part of the firm's strength lies in its flexibility, he said. Cases aren't assigned solely to one or two lawyers. The firm remains flexible in how it staffs a case so that client needs can best be met, he said.

Korin's supporters said his greatest strength is his ability to bring out the

best in his peers and co-workers.

Korin was born in Israel and grew up in Cleveland and Indianapolis. His degrees are from Indiana University. He said his parents, Uri and Dolly, have been great mentors. They taught him he could strive for anything he wants, but he always needed to give back to others.
